Pastoral Ponderings

In mid-April Diane Hludik, Sue Norton, and I went to Portland to join with other faith groups in a one-day workshop on domestic violence. We all agreed that this was worthwhile, informative, and a topic that should not remain dormant. Here is some information that is worth noting. While domestic violence is committed against both women and men, eighty five percent of the victims are women. However, those who are able to break the months and years of abuse do not consider themselves victims but survivors. Churches share some guilt surrounding domestic violence as they have often treated it lightly or inappropriately. Abusers rarely change. Abusers are great manipulators, even when mandatory therapy is required for their offense, convincing others that they

are changed persons, only to return to their abusive ways. Abuse is hidden. Abusers often know how to punch and strike areas of the body that are not publicly visible so that the abused person shows no signs of abuse. Abuse is not only physical but also psychological, wearing down the self-esteem of the abused to the point of feeling worthless. Often the question is asked, why don't those abused just leave? The answer is manifold but several reasons are that the abused are so worn down they are convinced that they cannot function by themselves in society. Another is that the abuser holds the purse strings. Abuse is not only physical and psychological, it is also spiritual. Abusers will ridicule one's religious beliefs and practices to the point that the abused may feel abandoned by God

The good news is that there are resources close by to deal with this. There are people who counsel, who protect, and who advocate in the court system. One who is abused does not have to stay in that situation and they need not feel that their freedom is solely in their own hands. Churches are an important part of that network, making connections between the abused and resources. Also, churches when properly educated are places where spiritual strength may be regained, thus becoming safe havens. That is why I am pleased that Diane and Sue were with me. I will be leaving when a new pastor arrives, but not only can they pass on the knowledge gained, they are also women who are the first line of defense for those escaping abuse.

One final note; I do not believe our church has

worked in an interfaith setting, that is with faiths other than Christian. Abuse is universal, knowing no creed or rite. Our workshop was made up of Christians, Jews, and Muslims. Universal problems cannot be addressed through parochialism. Action takes place when those of different beliefs work together with the common faith in God's love and justice that is found in all. Therefore, I hope that our horizons were broadened as we meet the challenges of a diverse world with justice, compassion, and a sense that God partners with us for the sake of redemption.

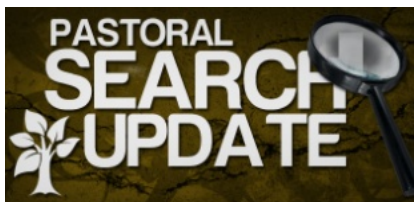
